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As part of the *City/Dans* series, Danspace Project presents the premiere of **Tom Pearson** and **Zach Morris**' latest evening-length contemporary dance work. Wickedly funny and suddenly somber, *Vanishing Point* fuses aggressive, exhaustive movement, meditative nuance, and live music by the alt-bluegrass ensemble **The Dang-it Bobbys**, led by composer **Kris Bauman**. The work will be presented in a three night engagement that runs Thursday, June 26th through Saturday, June 28th, 2008. Performances begin at 8:30PM.

Vanishing Point engages St. Mark's Church both as a sanctuary and an architectural structure evocative of the columns and porticos of the rural south. Fully self-aware and handled with equal measures of sincerity and irreverence, the performance unfolds as a fictional funeral (replete with inappropriate eulogies and talk about sex in church). Ricocheting backward and forward through time in a non-linear, photo album fashion, Vanishing Point shotguns from elusive impression to indelible imprint, skips decades, unearths fragments of a hidden past, and obsessively replays events in an attempt to articulate meaning out of fractured moments.

Culled from the artists' collective stories, *Vanishing Point* is an exploration of family legacies that have been shrouded in secrets, blurred by liquor, or -- in some cases -- composed of outright lies. A confluence of slipping memories, improbable tales, and faulty recollections, the work lives in the blurry spaces between truth and fabrication.

From knee-slappin' drinking songs to stark, brooding deconstructions of bluegrass forms, the music slides, tumbles, and thrashes, evoking summertime porches, barroom waltzes, and better times.

Collaborative artists and performers include **Donna Ahmadi**, Zach Morris, **Marissa Nielsen-Pincus**, Tom Pearson, **Tara O'Con**, and **Jennine Willet**. Costumes designed by **Karen Young** and lighting by **Carol Mullins** complement the work.

* The Thursday, June 26th performance will be followed by a Rap Up, a casual discussion between the artists and members of the audience, moderated by Brian McCormick.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Tom Pearson and **Zach Morris** (Third Rail Projects) work in a variety of media that includes contemporary dance, site-specific performance, film, visual art, and large-scale installations. Each work introduces its own movement and/or visual vocabulary, defined by the parameters of the subject, site, and performance environment. Through the lens of contemporary movement, unabashed theatricality and striking, dream-like images, Pearson and Morris create dense, evocative worlds that illuminate the transient and the transformational, using movement abstracted from and coupled with everyday action.

Tom Pearson and Zach Morris have been commissioned to create original site-specific works as part of Lower Manhattan Cultural Council's *SiteLines* series, the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian, Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, and the Hong Kong Youth Arts Foundation. Additionally, their work has been presented in New York by Dance Theater Workshop, Danspace Project, La Mama E.T.C., Theater for the New City, and Williamsburg Art NeXus, among others. www.thirdrailprojects.com

Kris Bauman is a multi-instrumentalist, who has performed extensively throughout Europe and in and around New York City since 1996. His performances can be heard on several rock, jazz, and R&B albums. He was featured with bassist Alexis Cuadrado on NPR's Studio 360. Bauman's band, The Dang-it Bobbys, was formed in 2004 and borrows from classic country music, newer acoustic/electric sounds, and the intricate songwriting of jazz standards of the 30's, 40's, and 50's.
